1. [Court Expansion - Split A - Roe v. Wade leak message] Lately, some have proposed expanding the number of seats on the Supreme Court from its current number of nine Justices. This would allow the current and future Presidents to nominate additional Justices to the Supreme Court, even if there are already nine Justices. The Senate would then have the option to take up, ignore, confirm, or deny this nomination. [Supporters of doing this say that many recent high-stakes rulings, including the recently leaked decision to overturn the Roe v. Wade abortion decision, show that the Court is too important to be controlled by a small number of ideologues, and should be expanded to make sure more voices contribute to these impactful decisions.] Opponents of doing this say this is a thinly-veiled attempt to throw the balance of the Court toward one particular partisan side. Generally speaking, would you [support or oppose] expanding the number of seats on the Supreme Court?

2. [Court Expansion - Split B - Loser Presidents message] Lately, some have proposed expanding the number of seats on the Supreme Court from its current number of nine Justices. This would allow the current and future Presidents to nominate additional Justices to the Supreme Court, even if there are already nine Justices. The Senate would then have the option to take up, ignore, confirm, or deny this nomination. [Supporters of doing this point out that five of the nine current Supreme Court Justices were nominated by Presidents who lost the popular vote in their elections. We can protect the legitimacy of the Court by adding additional Justices nominated by Presidents who represent the majority of Americans.] Opponents of doing this say this is a thinly-veiled attempt to throw the balance of the Court toward one particular partisan side. Generally speaking, would you [support or oppose] expanding the number of seats on the Supreme Court?

The Senate would then have the option to take up, ignore, confirm, or deny this nomination. [Supporters of doing this say for too long the Court has been controlled by rich old white men with Ivy League degrees and corrupting political connections. Expanding the Court would allow more opportunities to make the Court more representative of the rest of the country.] Opponents of doing this say this is a thinly-veiled attempt to throw the balance of the Court toward one particular partisan side. Generally speaking, would you [support or oppose] expanding the number of seats on the Supreme Court?

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This survey is based on 1,021 interviews conducted by YouGov on the internet of registered voters. The sample was weighted according to gender, age, race/ethnicity, education, and US Census region based on voter registration lists, the U.S. Census American Community Survey, and the U.S. Census Current Population Survey, as well as 2020 Presidential vote. Respondents were selected from YouGov to be representative of registered voters. The weights range from 0.21 to 5.07 with a mean of 1 and a standard deviation of 0.4.

The margin of error (a 95% confidence interval) for a sample percentage  $p$  based upon the subsetting sample is approximately 3.3%. It is calculated using the formula:

$$\hat{p} \pm 100 \times \sqrt{\frac{1 + CV^2}{n}}$$

where  $CV$  is the coefficient of variation of the sample weights and  $n$  is the sample size used to compute the proportion. This is a measure of sampling error (the average of all estimates obtained using the same sample selection and weighting procedures repeatedly). The sample estimate should differ from its expected value by less than margin of error in 95 percent of all samples. It does not reflect non-sampling errors, including potential selection bias in panel participation or in response to a particular survey.
