HOW THE POLL WAS CONDUCTED AND THE MARGIN OF ERROR CALCULATED

The CBS News/YouGov survey of 1,903 registered voters in New York City was conducted between September 7-13, 2025. Respondents were recruited from two sources: 1,338 were recruited via SMS message from a stratified random sample of the voter file, with another 565 from YouGov's U.S. panel. Both samples were selected to be representative of registered voters in New York City. All interviews were conducted online using YouGov's web-based survey system.

The sample was weighted according to gender, age, race, education, and NYC borough, based on the voter file, U.S. Census American Community Survey, and U.S. Census Current Population Survey, as well as to 2024 presidential vote and 2025 primary vote among voters whose turnout was validated against the voter file. "Likely voters" – respondents' relative probabilities of voting – were determined using a regression model that incorporates current, self-reported intentions to vote, along with individual-level and aggregate data about voters, such as demographics and vote history.

The weights range from 0.1 to 5.6, with a mean of 1 and a standard deviation of 0.7.

The *margin of error* (a 95% confidence interval) for a sample percentage p based upon the entire sample is approximately ± 2.7 points. It is calculated using the formula

$$\hat{p} \pm 100 \times \sqrt{\frac{1 + CV^2}{n}}$$

where CV is the coefficient of variation of the sample weights and n is the sample size used to compute the proportion. This is a measure of sampling error (the average of all estimates obtained using the same sample selection and weighting procedures repeatedly). The sample estimate should differ from its expected value by less than margin of error in 95 percent of all samples. It does not reflect non-sampling errors, including potential selection bias in panel participation or in response to a particular survey.
