## HOW THE POLL WAS CONDUCTED AND THE MARGIN OF ERROR CALCULATED

## October 1, 2024

This CBS News/YouGov survey of 1,630 interviews of likely voters who reported watching the vice-presidential debate on Tuesday, October 1, 2024. An initial survey was conducted by YouGov between September 27-30, 2024 using a nationally representative sample of 9,688 U.S. registered voters, including 5,763 likely voters who planned to watch the debate. Respondents who planned to watch the debate were recontacted for this survey. Only those who watched the debate were included in the analysis.

The initial sample was weighted according to gender, age, race, and education based upon voter registration lists and the U.S. Census Current Population Survey, as well as 2020 Presidential vote. The final sample of post-debate re-interviews was weighted to be representative of those who said they would watch the presidential debate according to gender, age, race, education, geographic region, and pre-debate vote choice. The weights range from 0.4 to 4.5, with a mean of 1 and a standard deviation of 0.5.

The margin of error (a 95% confidence interval) for a sample percentage p based upon the entire sample is approximately  $\pm$  2.7 points. It is calculated using the formula

$$\hat{p} \pm 100 \times \sqrt{\frac{1 + \mathsf{CV}^2}{n}}$$

where CV is the coefficient of variation of the sample weights and n is the sample size used to compute the proportion. This is a measure of sampling error (the average of all estimates obtained using the same sample selection and weighting procedures repeatedly). The sample estimate should differ from its expected value by less than margin of error in 95 percent of all samples. It does not reflect non-sampling errors, including potential selection bias in panel participation or in response to a particular survey.
