20. Generally speaking older people are more expensive to insure than younger people, because older people tend to need more medical care than younger people. Under current law, health insurance companies are only permitted to charge older people three times as much as they charge younger people. Congress is considering health care reform proposals that would allow health insurance companies to charge older people up to five times as much as they charge younger people. Some people say the three to one limit causes higher insurance premiums for younger people, while other people say the five to one limit causes higher insurance premiums for older people. What do you think is the right policy?

21. Health insurance works on the principle that healthy people who do not use a lot benefits pay premiums that cover the costs of caring for sicker people who do use a lot of benefits. If the costs of caring for sick people rises but the number of healthy people remains the same, then insurance providers can either try to cut the costs of caring for sick people or they can increase the premiums they charge for coverage. The health insurance death spiral is a condition in which healthy people decide to no longer buy insurance resulting in less money to cover the costs of caring for sicker people. This leads to either greater increases in premiums or greater cuts in benefits which then encourages even more healthy people to stop buying insurance. Eventually there may not be enough money to cover the costs of caring for sicker people. Before the Affordable Care Act, or "Obamacare", insurance companies would attempt to reduce the costs of caring for sick people by imposing lifetime and/or annual caps on benefits and sometimes refusing to offer coverage to people with pre-existing conditions. The Affordable Care Act prohibited insurance companies from imposing lifetime or annual caps on benefits or denying coverage based on a pre-existing condition, but it required everyone have health insurance as a way to force a large enough number of healthy people to remain in the health insurance pools. Republican health reform plans would remove the legal mandate requiring people have health insurance but would allow insurance companies to charge much higher rates to people who drop coverage as a way of discouraging people from dropping coverage. Republican reform plans would also ease prohibitions against insurance companies charging higher premiums to older and/or sicker people and also ease prohibitions against lifetime or annual caps.
